Using your detective skills, can you deduce if the person you are exploring was born in Woodstock or came from another country? Find out where they worked or lived on a map and where they shopped. Were they wealthy or not? Did they marry and have children? Are they buried in Woodstock? Read a letter or diary entry from some of our early settlers and create a paper trail of your own using a similar style of writing. The Internet is a great tool and can be used in this program if available in your classroom. This program gives students the opportunity to touch and interact with primary source documents as well as actual artifacts like photos and personal belongings in some instances.
